
SPRINGVILLE FIELD & STREAM CLUB, Inc.



A Letter From Our 2005 Second Scholarship Winner: Jonathon Reynolds

I am fortunate enough to only have one student loan left to pay off and plan on being debt free by May. All of the scholarships that I received including the one from the Field and Stream helped me to get to this point and they were all greatly appreciated. I would like to say thank you to you and the entire Field and Stream Club.

In 2005 I graduated 11th in my class from Springville Griffith Institute. In the fall I went to the State University of New York College of Environmental Science and Forestry (SUNY ESF) and quickly changed my major from Forestry to Wildlife Science. In the summer of 2006 I took a Student Conservation Association (SCA) internship working on a trail crew at Whiskeytown National Recreation Area (NRA) in northern California. My trail crew and I officially opened the James Carr Trail to Whiskeytown Falls. In the summer of 2007, Whiskeytown NRA hired me as a federal employee to supervise 12 SCA interns performing trail maintenance throughout the park. This was my first job working for the National Park Service (NPS). In 2008 I did another SCA internship, this one working with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) stationed in Fairbanks, Alaska. I spent 3 weeks in Fairbanks, and 7 weeks camped in the Alaskan backcountry on the banks of the Tozitna River monitoring spawning salmon populations. We installed a fish weir across the river which funneled any fish trying to swim upstream into a fish trap. The trap was checked every 30 minutes 24 hours a day. All fish in the trap were identified to species, counted, and then released upstream of the weir. Each day 50 of the salmon were randomly selected and additional data was taken on their length, sex, and age. The most common fish species were king salmon, chum salmon, arctic gravling, whitefish, suckers, and northern pike. I worked 7 days a week, and for 4 weeks I worked the midnight to 6 am shift alone while everyone else was a 1/4 mile away sleeping. We never had any serious bear problems at work, but we did see 5 black bears and 26 grizzlies. In 2009 I graduated from ESF with the highest GPA in the Wildlife Science Major. I was hired by the NPS as a seasonal Fisheries Biological Science Technician at Great Basin National Park in Baker, (a town of less than 100 people) Nevada. I worked for 5 months on a project restoring a species of management concern, the native Bonneville cutthroat trout (BCT), to the park's mountain streams. I also got to work in collaboration with the Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW) and with Utah Department of Natural Resources (DNR). In 2010 I was rehired and worked for 7 months. In 2011 I was promoted to a term position in which I can work up to 11 months a year depending on the budget. My job still mainly deals with the reintroduction efforts to restore BCT throughout their historic range. However, I also help the wildlife crew work with rattlesnakes, kingsnakes, collared lizards, and meso predators.

In the spring of 2005 I killed a 23 ½ pound tom turkey and in the fall I killed 2 doe. In 2007 I killed 3 doe and 1 buck. In the spring of 2008 I killed a 17 ½ pound tom turkey. In the summer the fish crew and I spent a lot of time pike fishing. The northern pike fishing in the oxbowl slews along the Tozitna River was unreal. In the fall I killed a doe. In 2009 I made it back from Nevada for deer season and killed my limit of deer. In 2010 I got to get some steelhead fishing in before I left for Nevada. I caught about 30 steelhead in a couple weeks. That summer I started calling coyotes out in Nevada and killed my first one. I came back to New York for deer season again and killed 4 deer. This year I went coyote hunting 4 times during which my buddy and I killed 5 coyotes. I also killed a mule deer and antelope on depredation hunts (both doe). I volunteered to help a coworker haul a 393 gross score bull elk of the mountain. I also started duck hunting with the park's wildlife biologist. We killed enough ducks that it was hard to eat or give them away fast enough. I killed my limit of deer again this year. I currently am a Nevada resident, but I purchased my New York State Lifetime Super Sportsman's License before I switched my residency. So now I will always be able to hunt and fish whenever I come back to New York.
